

President's Message: Return to Lake Time!

I am still grieving, but not dwelling upon what could have been the past two summers. Most of us lost someone or something personal to the virus and most of us have found solace in friends, family, and comfort in the familiar environ of our Lake. The pandemic brought high school and college kids back for the summer. Grown children armed with the flexibility of working from home returned and our parents and grandparents gravitated to Lakemont...shelter from the storm.

And, in spite of the virus, the Lake Rabun Association (LRA) and Lake Rabun Foundation (LRF) were able to execute on the core mission of supporting nearly 50 Lake Rabun Scholars in both 2020 and 2021. The LRF significantly increased its contributions to local causes and our membership continued to integrate into key volunteer positions in Rabun County and the surrounding community.

While able to return to an abbreviated schedule in 2021, plans for this summer are much more optimistic. As of today, all of the socials and educational activities we have enjoyed for years are back on the schedule! Work by the LRA Executive Committee has continued throughout the year and I would like to update the membership on several events planned as well as some other information I hope you will find useful.

2022 Home Tour: Cancelling the 2020 scheduled Home Tour was painful, as it was organized and ready to go. We are fortunate that Dirk Brown and Tim Burns have assumed the mantle of Tour Directors and that plans for the 2022 Tour are almost complete. There are always slots for additional volunteers. This is a premiere event executed by a cast of hundreds and we are expecting to once again sell out of tickets, so please go to https://lakerabun.org/ and secure your spot.

Lakemont U: The faculty and staff at Lakemont University are in the process of developing its 2022 programs. The focus remains on the history and culture of our region, our proximity to nature, and the varied and fascinating interests and hobbies of our members. If there is a subject you would like to know more about or an interest you would like to share, please contact Buz Stone or John King...our academic deans.

Membership Committee: Pat Hickey has been working with Darlene Warren and Lyn Asbill in conjunction with existing membership chairs, Michele Persons and Peter Watt, to revitalize our new member outreach. We are working with area realtors to identify new property owners or prospective members and have created a new member welcome packet to be personally delivered by a LRA member. Please help us to identify new prospects so that they can be contacted.

Volunteer Expo- Following Memorial Day General Meeting: Connie Thompson is working on our first Committee/Volunteer event to be held immediately following the Memorial Day General Meeting. We are looking forward to introducing new and established members to volunteer opportunities on the lake. Mimosas and snacks provided.

Associate Memberships: I'm interested in creating an associate membership level for our members' immediate family with perhaps a minimal charge of \$50 or \$75 per year. Associate Members would get separate listings in our directory, included in all eblasts and mailings, and a vote (when and if a vote is required). Feedback on this topic would be appreciated.

Membership Survey/Engineering Study/Wake/Surf Boat Concerns: The LRA conducted a membership survey in December 2020 based on safety concerns expressed by our members. The results indicated that 82% of respondents identified waves generated by boats under ballast as an issue that needed to be formally addressed. In 2020, an independent engineering firm was retained by Lakes Burton, Seed and Rabun to analyze the effect of large wakes on mountain lakes. The results of the survey and engineering report were published and available to all LRA members. A newly reconstituted Water Safety Committee is going to address the concerns. All input is welcome and there will be a presentation by the Water Safety Committee at the Memorial Day meeting.

CONVERSATION WITH GEORGIA POWER REGARDING LAKE ISSUES:

Jeff Jackson, who is Georgia Power's Lakes Resource Manager for North Georgia Lakes, and I spoke recently regarding several topics I believe will be of interest to our membership:

Invasive Weeds: Jeff explained that each year Georgia Power (GPC) monitors invasive weeds in Lake Rabun. If the invasive weeds present a navigation issue, treatment is scheduled. This is only for invasive weeds. Parrot Feather, also known as pond weed, is not considered an invasive weed. If treatment is required, it would typically be conducted in June or July. Jeff mentioned that the treatment was not particularly effective last year and that there will be a new plan this year, probably utilizing different chemicals.

• A big challenge has been treating the weeds from the boat ramp to Bear Gap because of the water depth. GP is primarily concerned with weeds that affect navigation. The GP plan is designed to target specific plants in specific locations, not a "body of water".

• Property owners should call GP and let them know of the location of the weeds. GP will visit the site and advise on treatment.

• GP has a program which allows individual property owners to submit an application to have a certified professional treat the area around their boat houses or docks.

• To find the aquatic weed information go to www.georgiapowerlakes.com and scroll down and click on North Georgia Mountain Lakes. At the top of the page, Aquatic Vegetation Management is where the information is located.

• Property owners are not allowed to treat invasive weeds as the chemicals could be harmful to neighboring water quality.

Water Testing:

• GP does chloroform testing when the public beaches are open throughout the season.

• Lake Rabun has been subject to robust testing by GP and year after year the testing numbers have shown results "close to drinking water quality". The state of Georgia also does periodic testing on Lake Rabun.

• Dick Simms tests Lake Rabun 2 or 3 times a year at the head of the Narrows and near the dam for e-coli and there has never been a concern.

• Everyone should be aware that water quality after heavy rains can be problematic with chemical and septic runoff. Dick is going to test this year after a big weather event to compare samples.

Fallen Tree Policy:

When trees fall into the lake, it is the responsibility of the property owner to remove the trees if they have fallen from their property. GP, as a general rule, does not require owners to remove the tree unless it poses a navigation/ safety issue. If in doubt, GP and DNR will evaluate to determine if it is a navigation or safety issue. In certain situations where navigation and safety present a hazard, GP will get involved in the removal process.

I would like to encourage members to come help with the Lake Clean Up so that some of the tree issues can be addressed. GP will be participating in the Lake Clean Up this year.

If there are questions about the invasive weed or downed tree policy, please call Cheryl Parker, our Lake rep and GP Senior Land Resources Manager.

The Lake Rabun Foundation Scholarship Program Thrives!

We began small ~ in 1987, one student received a \$1,000 scholarship for each of four years. Since then, the Foundation has assisted over 200 Rabun County students with multi-year college scholarships to 45 colleges and universities throughout the U.S., exceeding \$1,380,000 in scholarship funds.

We continue to grow... The scholarship award is currently $14,000 \sim 33,500$ / year for four years. We have approximately 45 Rabun County students receiving our scholarships each year beginning in their freshman year and ending upon graduation.

Since 2012, several grants from the Lake Rabun Foundation have been made to the North Georgia Technical College Foundation which allow financial assistance for Rabun County students attending North Georgia Technical College. Many students choose this route to prepare for technical careers or to complete their first two years of college and then transfer to other colleges to complete their degrees. Now, students may receive direct scholarship assistance from the Lake Rabun Foundation for both their technical school degrees as well as their bachelor's degrees.

The Lake Rabun Foundation scholarships are highly regarded in Rabun County. On Awards Night at Rabun County High School, our scholarships represent the largest financial investment and term ~ not just for one year but for all 4 years ~ of all local scholarships. Parents of previous scholarship students have shared with us that our Foundation scholarships have changed lives. The local community is aware of our scholarship program and appreciates what we are doing.

We will interview a new crop of students this Spring who all have high aspirations of attending either a four-year college or a technical school. Each applicant is evaluated by financial need, academic achievement, character, and involvement in the school and community. In addition, our scholarships are awarded to those who possess a positive attitude and the determination to be successful in college.

The Foundation Scholarship program is thriving. You can bet that we have challenges along the way given that we are working with students who face real world problems and some have not had opportunities or family support in their lives. Our goal is to endorse these smart, hard- working, and fantastic young adults while they are putting forth the effort to further their educations. As long as they are trying, we are there for them!

Tom and Sandy Gay - Every room in this bright and open home enjoys beautiful east and west views of Lake Rabun. Lake Safety Update

In response to a large number of concerns from members in December 2020, the LRA conducted a survey regarding the impact of wake surf waves on boating safety, the shoreline and shoreline structures. The survey generated 486 member responses and 1,000 comments, with 75% of respondents expressing concern that wake surf waves are a safety hazard and 82% of survey respondents expressing a desire for regulations to address ballasted wake surfing activity. The LRA Lake Safety Committee then began to explore options to manage the impact of wake surfing waves, including consideration of both boater education and regulation.

To scientifically measure the impacts of wake surfing waves, an engineering study was conducted on Lake Rabun, and the cost was shared jointly by the LRA and the Lake Burton and Lake Seed associations. The study concluded that buffer distances between ballasted wake surfing boats and other boats and/or the shoreline larger than current Georgia law of 100 feet are necessary to improve safety and reduce the impact of the large wakes.

With results from the survey and study, the Lake Safety Committee consulted with Georgia Power, the Georgia Department of Natural Resources (DNR), and the other lake civic associations as to the possible nature and scope of wake surf regulation. Georgia Power declined to take action regarding wake surf boat regulation, and the DNR was supportive of an increased buffer.

Following these conversations, State Representative Stan Gunter drafted a bill for consideration in the Georgia House Game, Fish and Parks Committee that would increase the buffer and also include a limit on the "dry weight" of wake surf boats,

which is a major determinant of wake size and energy. As part of the negotiations around the language in the bill, the Water Sports Industry Association, a wake surf trade association, also supported an increased 200 foot buffer. Due to limited time remaining in the 2022 legislation, the bill did not move out of committee and was not introduced.

At the request of Committee chair Trey Rhodes on March 24th, there was a public legislative hearing of the Committee to provide input for the possible introduction of a similar bill in the 2023 Georgia Legislature. Parties providing testimony included the LRA, The Lake Burton Civic Association, the DNR, and the WSIA. Members of the committee expressed interest in further investigating ways to mitigate the effects of wake surfing waves on smaller lakes. In fact, 32 states have considered legislation concerning wake surfing waves, including South Carolina, whose legislation increased the minimum buffer to 200 feet.

To provide more structure to address this important issue, the LRA has recently reconstituted the membership of the Lake Safety Committee to ensure that all parties are represented, ensure transparency, and ultimately put forth recommendations to the LRA membership that may include education, enforcement and regulatory components. Our intent for the Lake Safety Committee is to allow the LRA to address membership concerns regarding wake surfing safety, quality of life, and shore-line property impacts in a sensible and community-oriented way. Your Lake Safety Committee intends to follow progress on this issue closely over the next year, and we will report as developments warrant.
